





Introducing Assurance Inspections to Secure Training Centres

Consultation

About this consultation

This consultation sets out the proposal to introduce an additional inspection, to be called assurance inspections, to secure training centres (STCs). This consultation is targeted with key stakeholders invited to contribute.

About Ofsted, HMI Prisons and the Care Quality Commission

The Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (Ofsted) regulates and inspects to achieve excellence in the care of children and young people and in education and skills for learners of all ages.

HMI Prisons provides independent inspection of the conditions for and treatment of prisoners and other detainees.

The Care Quality Commission is the independent regulator and inspectorate of health and adult social care in England.

The inspectorates work forms part of the United Kingdom's obligations under the Optional Protocol to the United Nations Convention against Torture (OPCAT). OPCAT requires State Parties to regularly and independently inspect places of detention.

Purpose and background to the consultation

Since 2016, no STC has been judged higher than 'requires improvement to be good'. Our inspection reports reflect that STCs do not provide good enough care to children, and in some cases children have been at risk of harm or STCs have failed to keep them safe.

A second inspection each year will provide additional scrutiny of STCs. This assurance inspection will be a shorter inspection but will provide an opportunity to look at whether STCs are keeping children safe, that there is strong and effective leadership, and that actions are being taken to improve provision. This will mean that progress, or any deterioration in practice, will be more quickly identified and reported on. This follows a similar model to the one that Ofsted currently use in secure children's homes and children's homes.

An assurance inspection report will provide information to parents and stakeholders about children's care and safety at STCs. It will also provide information to the Secretary of State for Justice, the Ministry of Justice and the Youth Custody service in their oversight of STCs.

We will use the consultation responses to inform our new arrangements that we aim to introduce from April 2023.

How to respond to this consultation

We welcome your responses to this consultation. The consultation opens on 9 January 2023 and **closes on 22 January 2023**.

Proposals

- We will continue to inspect each STC annually and make a judgement on the four-point scale: outstanding, good, requires improvement to be good and inadequate.
- Assurance inspections will be an additional inspection to the current annual full inspection so that progress, or deterioration in practice, is more quickly identified. The main purpose of an assurance inspection is to ensure children are well cared for and being kept safe, and to assess progress since the last full inspection.
- Assurance inspections will result in a single judgement: 'There are serious and widespread concerns', or, 'There are no serious and widespread concerns'.
- Assurance inspections will be unannounced and usually take place over 2 days.
- We will review the impact of assurance inspections particularly if STCs are judged to be consistently good or better over time.

Assurance inspections will evaluate:

The care of children

- Children have trusted and secure relationships with staff.
- Children's social, physical, emotional, educational and mental health needs are well understood and effectively promoted.
- Children's views are understood and taken into account and their rights and entitlements are promoted and met.

The safety of children

- Risks are identified, understood and managed effectively.
- Staff are well prepared and supported to manage challenging situations and unsafe behaviour effectively.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers

- Leaders and managers use the findings from monitoring to improve the progress and experiences of children.
- Leaders and managers take robust action to address complaints or issues of concern.
- Leaders and managers ensure that there are sufficient suitably trained and experienced staff to meet children's individual needs.
- Leaders and managers have responded effectively to the recommendations made at the last inspection.

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Comments: However, we would caveat this in that we would wish to see evidence that training and principles of child first practice are carried through to practice. It is possible to demonstrate staff have been adequatley trained - the important issue is whether that training results in practice that truly supports children - and that leadership give appropriate time to allow for such quality practice. We would also wish to see that the understanding and promotion of children's needs are then met through onsite and resettlement provision - that will truly demonstrate child first and partnership working with the community.
